"An annotated bibliography is a list of citations to books, articles, and documents. Each citation is followed by a brief (usually about 150 words) descriptive and evaluative paragraph, the annotation. The purpose of the annotation is to inform the reader of the relevance, accuracy, and quality of the sources cited." *Cornell University LibGuide* (and example below right)


The **citation** is usually in the MLA or APA citation formats. Most articles from academic journals have an **abstract** that is a **summary** of the article. Please do not copy the abstract for your annotation.




2 The Annotation (Abstract)

Most academic articles (EBSCOhost and ProQuest) have the following features:

Title of the Article, the Author(s) of the article, and more! Source: The title of the magazine, journal or newspaper.

Abstract: A summary of the article. Please do not copy the abstract for your annotation but use it as a guide to summarize the article.



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
